

About Our District

"Little Town, Big Heart"

Location

Toolamba is a small town situated in the Goulburn Valley region of Victoria, Australia. The town and district is located in the City of Greater Shepparton area – a short 181 kilometres north of Melbourne.

Transport

Major transport routes that link to Toolamba through the Goulburn Valley region include the Goulburn Valley Highway and the Midland Highway. Passenger rail and coach services are provided from Melbourne to Shepparton.

Climate

The district has a warm climate with hot summers but cold winters. The hottest summer month is January, when the average temperature reaches 29.6C. In winter, the weather becomes coldest in July when the minimum averages 3.0C and the maximum reaches 13.0C.

The rainfall in the district is usually fairly sparse. The area generally does not receive high rainfalls throughout the year. Even the wettest month, July, averages only 48.9mm.

In the Beginning...

The Birth of Toolamba District.

The Toolamba District was inhabited by aboriginal groups prior to European settlement.

In 1844 Toolamba - or Innes Station as it was formerly known - was part of the Wanalta Run in North Central Victoria with David Norman Innes as the first licensee. He selected 87,801 acres on which he ran 6,000 sheep. Innes also selected Waranga and Wanalta, which covered 51,840 acres and 61,817 acres, respectively.

Henry & Patrick Stevenson took over Toolamba and Wanalta selections in 1846. The license for these selections was later transferred to Patrick Stevenson in 1860.

In 1857 the Winter brothers arrived in the Goulburn Valley, and by 1863 they had control of 323,000 acres of prime grazing land in the Toolamba District.

The Lands Acts of 1862 and 1865 allowed for the purchase of 160 acre lots at £1 per acre under certificate, provided that £1 was spent on improvements on each lot. These Acts effectively allowed the breakup of the selections.


Waranga was created as a Road District in June 1863 and Toolamba became part of that district in February 1865. The Shire of Waranga was created to take over the Road District in November 1865.

The original Township of Toolamba was established along the Murchison – Mooroopna Road in what is now Old Toolamba. A Post Office was opened here on 1st January 1873.

The district had a railway station located on the Goulburn Valley railway line that was opened in 1880, but was closed to traffic in 1987. The rail line has a junction at Toolamba which links to the line to Echuca.

Brief Facts About Us

At the 2011 census, Toolamba and the surrounding area had a population of 752, including 19 residents who identified with being Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. The median age of people living in the Toolamba ABS region was 38. Children in the 10-14 age bracket were the most heavily represented group in the Toolamba community, comprising 9.6% of the population, compared to 6.1% for Australia as a whole. The 80 to 84 year old age group is the most under- represented. There were 217 families in Toolamba in 2011

comprising of 110 families with children, 84 couples without children and 21 one-parent families. The median weekly household income was \$1,437, which was slightly below the national average. The labour force in 2011 was 408 comprising of 236 employed full-time, 131 employed part-time and 41 unemployed/away from work. The occupations of the district comprises of managers (71), labourers (58), technicians and trade workers (67), clerical and administrative workers (42), professionals (58), sales workers (32), machinery operators and drivers (26), and community and personal services (27). The unemployment rate at the time of the

2011 census (3.9%) was well below the national average of 5.4%. Finally, residents of Toolamba were predominantly born in Australia, with England, Italy, Greece, India and Japan also being represented.

Community organisations

The Toolamba District is supported by a variety of community based organisations and committees such as Lions, Cricket Club, Fishing Club, CFA and the Recreation Reserve Committee. Toolamba also offers a modern Primary School and Kindergarten.

Business

Toolamba is primarily an agricultural district with activities such as fruit and vegetable growing, dairy farming, cropping, wool growing, and cattle & sheep grazing. Water for irrigation is sourced from Lake Eildon and the Goulburn Weir. Many local residents work in nearby towns such as Tatura, Mooroopna and Shepparton. Currently the town has a general store and a hotel.

Our Values and Principles

The original Toolamba and District Community Plan was developed in 2011. Successes resulting from this plan include:

- The Toolamba history sign
- Public toilet (pictured)
- New car park at the recreation reserve (pictured)
- Development of a masterplan for the recreation reserve
- Installation of flag poles
- Fencing at the CFA building
- . Development of a playground
- · Acquisition of a portable PA and sound system

The 2016 Community Plan has built on the original, celebrating the successes of the steering committee and wider community, and asking residents and visitors what the next 5 years should bring for Toolamba.

The 2016 Toolamba and district community planning consultation included:

- Questionnaires distributed in the town and district.
- . Consultations at the monthly Food Swap.
- Online survey
- · Sausage sizzle at the Toolamba Primary School
- Meetings with representatives of groups including the Lions Club, Primary School, Kindergarten, Fishing Club and CFA.

These consultation activities have resulted in approximately 40 surveys being submitted, in addition to verbal feedback through one-on-one conversations. Key questions which were asked during the consultation included:

- What do you love about Toolamba?
- What challenges do you see Toolamba facing in the future?
- What ideas do you have for improving social connections, infrastructure, economy and natural environment in Toolamba?

With the outstanding response from the Toolamba and District community, and the number of residents who have volunteered to support implementation over the past several years, there is an expectation that the hopes, ideals and needs of Toolamba and District will continue to be addressed into the future. The Toolamba and District Community Plan Steering Committee are always happy to welcome new members, and eagerly embrace the skills and experience that new people bring to the group.


Why do we love living in Toolamba?

Implementing the Community Plan

The Toolamba and District Community Plan Steering Committee have a primary function of supporting the implementation of the community plan by:

- Maximising access to resources and funding.
- Involving community groups and residents to contribute to the initiatives and priorities.

Improving coordination and developing well organised and planned projects within the Toolamba community will increase the chances to involve other levels of government or the private sector.

The Steering Committee will ensure that on commencement of each initiative, residents and groups will be invited to participate. In order to undertake various projects or initiatives, the Steering Committee may form working groups (or sub committees), often with existing groups as the lead, to develop more detailed plans to implement projects. This step will provide an opportunity for interested local residents or groups to become involved.

Once the working groups have undertaken detailed planning and presented them to the Steering Committee, the Steering Committee will ratify the proposed actions and support each working group in their implementation process.

Although the process will be supported in many instances with resources from the Greater Shepparton City Council, Council are not the only resource available. There will often be other organisations willing to provide assistance and financial support. Identifying which organisations can assist and the level of support that may be available will be part of the role of the working groups when undertaking the detailed planning and implementation.

The Community Plan is only effective to the extent that it reflects the current goals of the community. As such, the plan is completely reviewed every 5 years, with a review of the Action Plan occurring annually. This ensures that the plan reflects the changing needs and aspirations of the community it represents. This current plan was created in 2016.
